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Himalayan Balsam: Impatiens glandulifera

This tall plant (up to 2m), is found growing in bare places, along streams or where the ground is wet. It has large pink flowers, made up of two 2 "lips". The leaves have small red "teeth" along them. They are arranged opposite each other or in threes. The plant was introduced to Britain from India in 1839 as a garden plant, but it quickly "escaped" to grow in the wild. It can be a problem as it "takes over" from native plants Where I found it:

Common mouse-ear chickweed.

Cerastium fontanum

This low-growing plant has tiny, white, five-petalled flowers. The petals have notches in them and green sepals appear between the petals. Its dark green hairy leaves are oval, in opposite pairs and thinner near the stem It grows in clumps.. It is a common weed in gardens, grassy and bare ground. Its seeds can survive in the ground for up to 40 years.
