Why do the Latin names of plants change? (short series of 2 talks) with Chris Metherell

Monday and Wednesday January 24th and 26th 19:00-19:35 Many botanists find Latin names difficult to recall at the best of times. When "experts" start monkeying around with them the situation gets even worse. And no-one ever seems to explain exactly why the changes are made and so the whole thing becomes inexplicable and irritating! This short series of two talks seeks to at least demystify the process by explaining how and more importantly why names change. I can't promise to make the situation less annoying but at least you'll know why it happens!

19:00-20:00 The talk will concentrate on a few interesting and spectacular species. It will include a lot about pollination, ecology, and interaction with the indigenous peoples of Amazonia. There will also be a strong conservation message.

Spring in a Hampshire Wood with Jill Oakley

Wednesday March 16th 19:00-20:00 Spring in a little gem of a Hampshire wood with a good selection of spring flowers and some interesting ancient woodland indicator species. From early through to late spring showing the wide variety of plants and the changes through the season

Alpines of Britain and Europe with Peter Llewellyn

Wednesday April 27th 19:00-20:00 A virtual tour of British and European sites for finding familiar and unfamiliar alpine plants flowering in abundance.

Introduction to Mosses and Liverworts with Martin Godfrey

Wednesday October 12th

A gentle introduction to Mosses and Liverworts, their structure, biology and identification. These tiny plants grow in all kinds of habitats, from pavement cracks and lawns to mountain tops via wood, marsh and coastal rocks, so are very accessible wherever you are. Early autumn is an ideal time to get out and start looking as they are often at their best in the cool damp days between autumn and spring when we start feeling a bit deprived of flowering plants.

The fascinating relationship between hoverflies and the plants in our gardens and local countryside. Hoverflies are the flies that everyone loves and this is an opportunity to find out more about their lifestyle as well as learning to recognise a few of the common ones that we will encounter.

19:00-20:00 Find out about the causes of those strange shapes, lumps, bumps, and growths on plants – the galls. What causes them, how do you identify them and where can you find out more about them? If you look at galls you also are learning about fungi, insects and mites too. Delve into the wonderful world of plant galls.
